Jesus' Death, Burial, and Resurrection

Despite the world-wide shaking in April, it was a time to celebrate. Holy Week, Resurrection Sunday, and Passover all occurred during the month. This is when people around the nations reflect upon the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. These events are the backbone of Christianity, and hold great significance.

The death of Jesus on the cross is very significant. Jesus' final words were, "It is finished!" (John 19:30.) Jesus' finished work means He conquered both sin and death. Jesus was the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world (John 1:29). Jesus' death also destroyed the power of death that the devil acquired (Hebrews 2:14).

Jesus' burial was significant because it adds validity to the resurrection. The Scriptures tell us in Matthew 27:62-66, that the chief priests and Pharisees asked Pilate to secure the tomb. Jesus is now the bridge that grants every person access to the Heavenly Father. Under the old system, only the high priest could enter the Holy of Holies once per year to meet with God. Because of Jesus' death, burial, and resurrection, we can now go boldly before the throne of grace so that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need (Hebrews 4:16).
